Grace from a Biblical standpoint is defined as unmerited or undeserved favor. Newton held himself as a prime example of a person who deserved no grace, and yet, in Jesus' life and example, he found true freedom in what he called Amazing Grace.

For us, perhaps, the question becomes how do we reflect this grace, not just as a platitude but in the gritty moments of real life, when we feel wronged, or we have wronged another?
